### **Data strategies for policymaking: Identifying international good practice (2011)**

**Author:** Philipp-Bastian Brutscher, Jan Tiessen, Ala'a Shehabi, Daniel Schweppenstedde, Claire Celia, Christian van Stolk, Tom Ling

**Description:** "With the move towards evidence-based policymaking, the need for high-quality data — which can include statistical and qualitative data, but also existing research — has increased for policy makers and public sector organisations. Against this background DG SANCO asked RAND Europe to explore international good practice of using data in policymaking. Based on previous research in this field, this report develops a conceptual framework for characterising and classifying the different elements of a data strategy for public sector organisations. This framework comprises the key questions of how to identify and define data needs, how to collect data, how to analysis and how to use data. This framework is then applied to the analysis of thirteen cases studies. These thirteen case studies illustrate how different organisations in the fields of health, consumer, food and feed safety and animal welfare policy handle their data needs in policy making. The report concludes by identifying the key choices that need to be made in developing and implementing a data strategy for policymaking." **Accelerating the education sector response to HIV : five years of experience from Sub-Saharan Africa (2010)**

**Author:** The World Bank

**Description:** The work described in this review shows the commitment of education teams throughout Africa to contribute to the multisectoral response to HIV/AIDS. It is also a testament to the leadership shown by Ministries of Education, in helping the new generation of children and youth grow up better able to challenge HIV, and in providing care and support for the educators who often represent more than half the public sector workforce. The work described in this review does not suggest any single solution. Instead, the approach is based on the recognition that Africa is a diverse continent, and countries need to find their own local approaches to the epidemic

The materials are intended to improve the knowledge, skills, and confidence of a range of professional and lay health workers within PMTCT programs, thus enhancing the scope and quality of services available to PMTCT clients and their families. All of the materials included in the Toolkit are generic in form, and thus allow Ministries of Health, provincial and district authorities, health facilities and health workers, and implementing partners to adapt the content to suit specific programmatic and policy contexts.

## **Method for Synthesizing Knowledge about Public Policies (2010)**

**Author:** Public Health Agency of Canada through funding for the National Collaborating Centre for Healthy Public Policy

**Description:** “Public policy can act as a lever for action that affects population health. Therefore, public health actors are called upon to produce knowledge syntheses in order to inform decision makers during the promotion, adoption and implementation of public policies. But studying these policies raises specific challenges. Drawing inspiration from political science, literature on evidence-informed decision making in public health, literature on evaluation and on deliberative processes, the NCCCHPP has developed a knowledge synthesis method that is applicable to public policies. Using this method, one can document the effects and equity of the policies under study, as well as implementation issues of concern to decision makers (costs, feasibility, acceptability), based on the construction of logic models, on the scientific and grey literatures, and on deliberative processes organized to gather contextual information.”

Based on this knowledge and information the purpose is to find an explanation for why people respond differently to policies and interventions. It provides a simple approach to meet the minimum requirements set with the ultimate objective to comply with ISO 15189 in a logical and step-by-step manner

## **Making Shared Decision-Making a Reality. No decision about me, without me**

**Description:** The King’s Fund - London UK – July, 2011. “The principle of shared decision-making in the context of a clinical consultation is that it should: support patients to articulate their understanding of their condition and of what they hope treatment (or self-management support) will achieve; inform patients about their condition, about the treatment or support options available, and

about the benefits and risks of each; ensure that patients and clinicians arrive at a decision based on mutual understanding of this information; record and implement the decision reached. The paper outlines the importance of communication skills and sets out how clinicians might approach consultations to arrive at shared decisions. It also suggests that tools that help patients in making decisions are just as important as guidelines for clinicians. Clinicians will find evidence for the benefits of shared decision-making and practical support in implementing it.

### Jing

**Description:** Jing is a free screencapture/screencasting tool from TechSmith, the company that also produces SnagIt and Camtasia. The free version of Jing produces .swf (Flash) videos up to five minutes in length. Jing videos can be saved to your own computer, sent directly to an ftp server, hosted at screencast.com, embedded in a blog or web page, or shared with Flickr or YouTube. For \$14.95 a year, Jing Pro removes Jing branding from your videos, allows for simultaneous recording from a webcam, and uses a different format (MPEG-4) to maximize quality and minimize file size.
